#### Rationale for Regional Balance

- Should every region have the same GVA/Income/Unemployment rate/ Population Density?
- From an economic point of view regional imbalance is only an issue if it results in inefficiencies. Too much balance could actually be inefficient!
- Some models show that regional imbalance can be self sustaining and thus lock regions into a low growth path – inefficient imbalance!
- It is important to consider the costs and benefits.




#### **More Even Distribution**

- It is not straightforward to compare Ireland with other OECD countries (incl. Scandinavia)
- The scale of our urban centres is much much smaller less than 40 over 10,000
- Ireland has a smaller proportion of traditional (heavy) industries – these are shrinking and deconcentrating
- Recent growth in non-urban employment is largely driven by construction – this will shrink!
- It is likely that future growth in Ireland will be more urban driven than it has been!


### Distribution of the Population






## **Distribution of Jobs**













Jobs in Construction

#### **Transport and Sustainability**

- Good transport infrastructure is a necessary but not sufficient condition for regional growth
- Transport infrastructure can be a double edged sword!
- More even distribution of the population, which we have seen over the last decade, if not matched with a more even distribution of jobs will increase average commuting distance.
- This population will also be more difficult to reach with public transport.
